GOALS

To empower our Chinese-American children, strengthening their ties to both cultures in sessions teaching Chinese language, heritage and cultural activities.

To expand ethnic identity and build self-esteem, helping better prepare our children to respond to prejudice by developing skills for dealing with racism.

To kindle new and close friendships, explore mutual adoption journeys, and build a sense of lasting community among children who share similar histories.

Content

Adoption journeys and self identity, Asian-American pride project and performance, Sons of China tribe time each day, Asian festivals, Chinese games and songs, Chinese jump rope, chopstick races, Choy Lay Fut Kung Fu lessons, kite building, lion dance participation, mahjong lessons, Mandarin vocabulary, conversation and character instruction, media presentations created by the oldest group, provinces of China and geography exploration, ribbon making and dancing, tea ceremony and tools for combating racism and building tolerance.

Service project: Each camper will create a pillow for the Texas Oncology program to assist and comfort patients seeking treatment for cancer during the chemotherapy process.

Food & SNACK

All students will be asked to bring a sack lunch each day. Each family will be asked to bring healthy snacks for one of the mornings to share with their class. All families are invited to a Friday night pot luck end-of camp celebration.

Teachers

Each class will have adult Asian-American counselors assisting teachers and supervising and nurturing the children. We strive for a 1:5 ratio in all sections.

Linda Cao has been an active member of the UT Dragon/ Lion Dance Team for over ten years and participates in many festivals and events throughout the Austin area. She and Todd Morton conducted the lion dance demonstration and taught the master drumming class at last year's camp. **Stephen Chao**, a student at Westwood High School, will assist Mr. Gabrillo with the musical preparations. Stephen sings in the Conspirare Youth Choir.

Xiwei Chen is the director of The April Rain School of Chinese Dance, founded in 2003. Her students have danced in many festivals and events in the Austin area, and she will again teach Chinese games and songs as she did at last year's camp.

Stacey Cone, Ph.D., is a retired professor of journalism and documentary film producer for the Cable News Network. She has two daughters from China and will co-teach the media presentation portion of the camp with Yvonne Lim Wilson.

Rick Gabrillo is currently the assistant conductor of Conspirare and performs with the professional ensemble throughout the year as well as serving as the administrative director of the youth choir. Rick taught at Clint Small Middle School for 8 years where his choral program was recognized statewide for artistic excellence.

Fursey Gotuaco is an assistant principal in the Fort Worth area and outstanding theatre director; his students and plays have won many awards and recognitions. Fursey directed last year's camp play production of Stone Soup and this year will teach classes on community building and team bonding.

Em Hardy, Ph.D., is an Austin psychologist/ psychotherapist/consultant with a specialty in adoption, attachment, and bonding. Since obtaining her Ph.D. in psychology from Michigan State University, she has had over 25 years of varied experience, including training with the Attachment and Bonding Center (ABC) of Ohio, and is a registered clinician with ATTACh.org.
